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

THE HOLY SPIRIT FELL UPON ALL WHO WERE LISTENING

(Acts 10:44)

YEAR B


The story of Peter and Cornelius is one of the most remarkable in the Book of Acts and worth reading in its entirety (10:1-49). Yet none of it would have happened if these two men had not been open to the possibility of God doing something new. Peter, a devout Jew, had never eaten anything "unclean." When God gave him a vision asking him

to eat one of those forbidden animals, Peter's first reaction was to recoil in horror. But when three men arrived asking him to come to Cornelius' house, Peter realized what the vision meant. Despite the strict separation between Gentile and Jew that had been practiced for centuries, God wanted him to go (10:17-20).

Cornelius was a "God-fearer," meaning he was a Gentile who worshipped the God of Israel. His openness to God had been nurtured through years of following the Lord. So when an angel appeared to him and told him to send for Peter, he obeyed. Than as Peter was proclaiming the gospel, Cornelius received the Holy Spirit and spoke in tongues (10:44-46).

How can we be open to the Lord and whatever "new things" he may want to do through us? First, like Peter and Cornelius, we need to stay close to God in prayer. Because of their faithfulness, God was able to speak to both men

and show them how he wanted to bring salvation to the Gentiles. Second, we



should be careful not to place limits on God. Peter had to trust God with a new and different way of living out his faith. Cornelius had to be open to receiving new life in the Spirit through Baptism. Are you open to anything God might ask of you? Today, pray for the grace to see where you might have drawn a line in the sand that you have asked God not to cross, God can, and will, use you as long as you remain open to him.



Today we honour and pray for all mothers, living and deceased who lovingly and generously welcomed the gift of life, all these women who have exercised a motherly role in our lives and life-giving and lifeaffirming in their service to others.

POPE FRANCIS URGES CATHOLICS TO PRAY IN MAY FOR AN END TO COVID-19 PANDEMIC

Pope Francis invites Catholics and Marian Shrines around the world to dedicate the month of May to a marathon of prayer for an end to the Covid-19 pandemic. Catholics across the globe are encouraged to dedicate the Marian month of May to praying for an end to the pandemic. The initiative, behind which the Pope has thrown his support, involves 30 Marian Shrines from various parts of the world. The Pontifical Council for Promoting the New Evangelization announced the news with a press release last week. It takes place under the theme "the whole Church was fervently praying to God", which recalls a verse in the Book of Acts (12:5)





"The initiative will involve all Shrines of the World in a special way, so that they might encourage the faithful, families and communities to recite the Rosary to pray for an end to the pandemic". Pope Francis will open the Marian month of Prayer on May 1st with a Rosary broadcast across the Vatican Media platform. Each day will see Vatican News Broadcast the recitation of the Rosary at 6:00 p.m. Rome time from various Shrines taking part in the initiative. The Pope will also close the initiative on May 31st with another special broadcasted Rosary.

END TO THE PANDEMIC

This year's dedication of May to pandemic related prayer recalls a similar occurrence during the first wave in March 2020 (Vatican News). Pope Francis led the world in prayer during that confusing and difficult time, celebrating a

live-streamed daily Mass in the Casa Santa Maria. After more than a year, and with the world still in the grips of the pandemic, the Pope and Church around the world are once again leading the way in imploring God for an end to the suffering and loss which so many people are forced to bear (Vatican News).
