GOSPEL INSPIRATION GOD DID NOT SEND HIS SON INTO THE WORLD TO CONDEMN THE WORLD (John 3:14-21)

Do you think of Jesus as a divine accountant? You know, someone who has a ledger and checks to see if you measure up to his exacting rigorous standards? In today's Gospel, Saint John reminds us that Jesus was sent into the world not to condemn but to save us. He didn't come to tally up our good deeds and our bad deeds. He came to heal, protect, and rescue us. How can that be?

John3:14-15 gives us a clue. Yes, we do fall short of God's commands and his vision for our lives. But rather than justly condemning us, God sent Jesus to be "lifted up" and to give "eternal life" to all who believe in him. That refers to the story in the Book of Exodus, when the Israelites were bitten by poisonous snakes for complaining against God. God directed Moses to make a bronze serpent and mount it on a pole so that anyone who looked at it was healed. Like the Israelites, our first step is to acknowledge our need for salvation, even though that may mean facing all the ways we fall short. After all, what could be more convicting than knowing that Jesus bore our own sins on the cross? But like the Israelites, we can look to the answer God gave us: the cross of Jesus. The salvation Jesus offers us is far greater than the Israelites' physical healing from snakebites. He heals 115 spiritually. He forgives us and strengthens us to live differently. He restores us to a right relationship with God. And he gives us a real hope of heaven. So don't fall into the trap of thinking of Jesus as an accountant. He is not in the business of condemning but of offering salvation. Today, gaze at him, lifted up on the cross. Bring your neediness to him, and let him heal and restore you.

Covid-19 Revised Restrictions PLACES OF WORSHIP

On Friday, March 12th the provincial government announced changes to the restrictions on places of worship currently in the Grey (Lockdown) Zone. As of **Monday, March 15, 2021**, churches in this designation (in the archdiocese, currently Toronto and Peel Regions) will be permitted **15 percent capacity** for religious services.

We will begin to celebrate public Masses by tomorrow, Monday March 15. Holy Communion services will be <u>discontinued</u> after this Sunday, March 14, 2021.

A few very important additional points:

- The Grey (Lockdown) Zones are still very much the areas where positive cases of Covid-19 are highest in the province. For the safety of all, it is imperative that everyone does their part to follow **WorshipSafe** guidelines to protect parishioners, clergy, and staff.
- Please do not congregate in or around the church after services in large numbers. Arrival and dismissal will be co-ordinated in such a fashion to ensure large groups do not congregate. This policy includes weddings, funerals, and baptisms.
- We hope our Livestreaming of services will continue, barring any technological difficulties. The dispensation from the Sunday Eucharist will continue for those of our brethren that find it difficult to attend church physically. The elderly, those with compromised immune systems or other health conditions are asked to exercise extreme caution about any outings, including attendance at church.

HOW TO RESERVE YOUR SEAT

ON SUNDAYS

The parish will be using Eventbrite to facilitate the return to in-person mass. This ticketing system will help us ensure that we do not exceed the 15% capacity on Sundays. It also makes contact tracing possible.

FUNERALS IN GREY ZONE

Please note that for funerals, at present, the Bereavement Authority of Ontario (BAO) has indicated that funeral home staff will **not be permitted** to assist inside a church if there are more than 10 people present in the Grey Zone. If attendance exceeds that number, funeral home staff have been directed by the BAO to place the casket at the church entrance and return to their vehicles. Upon completion of the service, church personnel / family are to return the casket to the hearse for delivery to the cemetary.



All arrivals without a reservation will be **put on standby** and will be seated in the church **only if the church has not exceeded capacity according to the Worshipsafe guidelines outlined by the Archdiocese of Toronto.** Staff will be present at the entrance of the church at all Sunday masses to guide you.

Solemnity of St. Joseph



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Saint Joseph's feast day, Friday, March 19th will be celebrated both in-person and with a livestreamed Mass at 7:00 p.m. All are invited parishioners to celebrate the Patron of the Universal Church and Patron of Canada. Canada was first consecrated to Saint Joseph by the Franciscan Recollet Fathers in 1624. Devotion to Saint Joseph was brought to our area by the Jesuit missionaries who dedicated the land of Huronia to the fosterfather of the Saviour. The church at the mission of Sainte-Marie near Midland, where the bodies of Saints Jean de Brebeuf and Gabriel Lalement were first interred, is named after Saint Joseph as is the present Martyrs' Shrine church. The largest church in the world dedicated to Saint Joseph is here in Canada: St. Joseph's Oratory in Montreal. Let us pray to our great Patron, Saint Joseph, for the people of Canada, our government and national institutions, and that our society may protect and defend the sanctity of human life, marriage and the family. May our country remain true to the Christian values and foundation on which it was built and to which the Catholic Church has

been an important contributor.



Virtual Easter Praise Night




The plan is on for another beautiful musical encounter! Let's gather together to celebrate Easter with a night of song and praise to our Lord. Be sure to

As we begin this season of grace, a couple of notes to remind us of the rules of the church to help us practice our faith and prepare for our Lenten journey.


- Canon 1250 All Fridays through the year and at the time of Lent are penitential days and times throughout the entire Church.
- Canon 1251 Abstinence from eating meat or another food according to the prescriptions of the conference of bishops is to be observed on Fridays throughout the year unless they are solemnities; abstinence and fast are to be observed on Ash Wednesday and on the Friday of the Passion and Death of Our Lord Jesus Christ.
- Canon 1252 All persons who have completed their fourteenth year are bound by the law of abstinence; all adults are bound by the law of fasting up to the beginning of their sixtieth year. Nevertheless, pastors and parents are to see to it that minors who are not bound by the law of fast and abstinence are educated in an authentic sense of

May we fast from anger. And feast on reconciliation. May we fast from selfishness. And feast on generosity. May we fast from resentment. And feast on gratitude. May we fast from fear. Amoris Laetitia Family

The Vatican will mark the fifth anniversary of the publication of Amoris laetitia, Pope Francis' 2016 exhortation on the family, with a live-streamed event on March 19, 2021.

The online meeting, titled "**Our Daily Love**," will open a year dedicated to the family, as announced by Pope Francis in December.

The March 19 event will be live-streamed on YouTube from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m. Rome time. The first part will include a video message from Pope Francis.

The year, given the official name "Amoris Laetitia Family," will begin on March 19 and end on June 26, 2022, with the 10th World Meeting of Families, which will be hosted in Rome.

St. James the Apostle church in Nurio, in the Mexican state of Michoacán, was destroyed by a fire on Sunday, March 7, 2021. The church building which dates back to 1639, contained historical works of indigenous art. The exterior walls of the church are standing, but the roof and interior have been gutted. *Let us keep the parishioners in our prayers.*



In the past few days, the Lord allowed me to visit Iraq, carrying out a project of Saint John Paul II. Never before has a Pope been in the land of Abraham. Providence willed that this should happen now, as a sign of hope, after years of war and terrorism, and during a severe pandemic.

After this Visit, my soul is filled with gratitude - gratitude to God and to all those who made it possible: to the President of the Republic and the Government of Iraq; to the country's Patriarchs and Bishops, together to all the ministers and members of the faithful of the respective Churches: the religious to Authorities, beginning with the Grand Ayatollah Al-Sistani, with whom I had an unforgettable meeting in his residence in Najaf.

I strongly felt a penitential sense regarding this pilgrimage: I could not draw near to that tortured people, to that martyr-Church, without taking upon myself, in the name of the Catholic Church, the cross they have been carrying for years; a huge cross, like the one placed at the entrance of Qaragosh. I felt it particularly seeing the wounds still open from the destruction, and even more so when meeting and hearing the testimony of those who survived the violence, persecution, exile... And at the same time, I saw around me the joy of welcoming Christ's messenger; I saw the hope of being open to a horizon of peace and fraternity, summed up in Jesus's words that were the motto of the Visit: "You are all brothers" (Mt 23:8). I found this hope in the discourse of the President of the Republic. I discovered it again in the many greetings and testimonies, in the hymns and gestures of the people. I read it on the luminous faces of the young people, in the vivacious eyes of the elderly, in people who stood waiting for the Pope for 5 hours, even women with children in their arms.

They waited and there was hope in their eyes. The Iraqi people have the right to live in peace; they have the right to rediscover the dignity that belongs to them. Their religious and cultural roots go back thousands of years: Mesopotamia is the cradle of civilization. Historically, Baghdad is a city of primary importance. For centuries, it housed the richest library in the world. And what destroyed it? War. War is always that monster that transforms itself with the change of epochs and continues to devour humanity. But the response to war is not another war; the response to weapons is not other weapons. And I asked myself: who was selling the weapons to the terrorists? Who sells weapons today to the terrorists which are causing massacres in other areas, let's think of Africa, for example? It is a question that I would like someone to answer. The response is not war, but the response is fraternity. This is the challenge not only for Iraq. It is the challenge for many regions in conflict and, ultimately, the challenge for the entire world is fraternity.

Will we be capable of creating fraternity among us? Of building a culture of brothers and sisters? Or will we continue the logic Cain began: war. Brothers and sisters. Fraternity.

Featured: Saint Patrick - March 17th

St. Patrick was born in Britain—not Ireland—to wealthy parents near the end of the fourth century. He is believed to have died on March 17, around 460 A.D.

Although his father was a Christian deacon, it has been suggested that he probably took on the role because of tax incentives and there is no evidence that Patrick came from a particularly religious family. At the age of 16, Patrick was taken prisoner by a group of Irish raiders who were attacking his family's estate. They transported him to Ireland where he spent six years in captivity. During this time, he worked as a shepherd outdoors and away from people. Lonely and afraid, he turned to his religion for solace, becoming a devout Christian. It is also believed that Patrick first began to dream of converting the Irish people to Christianity during his captivity.

After more than six years as a prisoner, Patrick escaped. According to his writing, a voice-which he believed to be God'sspoke to him in a dream, telling him it was time to leave Ireland. To do so, Patrick walked nearly 200 miles from County Mayo to the Irish coast. After escaping to Britain, Patrick reported that he experienced a second revelation—an angel in a dream tells him to return to Ireland as a missionary. After his ordination as a priest, he was sent to Ireland with a dual mission: to minister to Christians already living in Ireland and to begin to convert the Irish. (Source: History.com)


