GOSPEL INSPIRATION I AM TROUBLED. (John 12:27)

Jesus was troubled? That's putting it mildly. The Greek word John used here means to be greatly distressed or in fear and dread. It's the same word used to describe the disciples' reaction to a deadly storm at sea (Matthew 14:26). It's the same kind of distress that King David felt as he wept over his slain son, Absalom (2 Samuel 19:1), and that Lot felt as he fled the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah (Genesis 19:16).

So what troubled Jesus so much? The realization that his "hour" had come (John 12:33). After spending so much time preaching and teaching, healing people and driving out demons, Jesus had now arrived at the time for his passion. He knew that agonizing torture and slow, lingering death awaited him, and the thought of it filled him with dread. Yet Jesus also knew that, as terrible as it would be, the cross was necessary if he was going to save us from sin. It wouldn't be easy; it wouldn't be pretty, but it was necessary. So rather than shrinking back, he placed himself in God's hands and trusted that his Father would see him through it. He loved us too much to walk away.

We all face times when we feel troubled. It could be because we are witnessing a loved one suffering, or it could be as we face our own suffering. It's painful; it's challenging, but it's unavoidable. If that describes you today, know that you are not alone. Jesus has his arm around you and is holding you close. He knows what it's like to feel so distressed that you want to run away. And because he knows, he can comfort you and help you. Jesus endured the cross because he knew that his death would reveal the depths of God's love for us ~ and for you. Let that love surround you and sustain you today. *Source: Living with Christ*

We all know that adjustments to our celebrations have been made these days to keep us all safe in the face of the pandemic. For Holy Week this Archdiocese the year, of Toronto has provided us with a few guidelines during Holy Week:

Palm Sunday: there will be a simple entrance, no gathering in the foyer. Ushers (with gloves) will hand us blessed palms at the entrance.

Holy Thursday: There will be no washing of the feet this year. There will neither be an alter of repose nor procession with the Blessed Sacrament after Mass. We are encouraged to adore and pray from our pews. The Tabernacle will be opened for adoration until 10:00PM.

Good Friday: There will be no individual veneration of the cross. General veneration from our pews is recommended. We are also encouraged to bring our own crosses for adoration, spiritual or physical.

Easter Vigil: The pascal candle will be lit and placed on the altar this year; there will be no service of light. Holy water will be sprinkled from the altar for the renewal of our baptism.



As we begin this season of grace, a couple of notes to remind us of the rules of the church to help us practice our faith and prepare for our Lenten journey.

- **Canon 1250** All Fridays through the year and at the time of Lent are penitential days and times throughout the entire Church.
- Canon 1251 Abstinence from eating meat or another food according to the prescriptions of the conference of bishops is to be observed on Fridays throughout the year unless they are solemnities; abstinence and fast are to be observed on Ash Wednesday and on the Friday of the Passion and Death of Our Lord Jesus Christ.
- Canon 1252 All persons who have completed their fourteenth year are bound by the law of abstinence; all adults are bound by the law of fasting up to the beginning of their sixtieth year. Nevertheless, pastors and parents are to see to it that minors who are not bound by the law of fast and abstinence are educated in an authentic sense of penance.
- Canon 1253: It is for the conference of bishops to determine more precisely the observance of fast and abstinence and to substitute in whole or in part for fast and abstinence other forms of penance especially works of charity and exercises of piety.

Covid-19 Revised Restrictions PLACES OF WORSHIP

On Friday, March 12th the provincial government announced changes to the restrictions on places of worship currently in the Grey (Lockdown) Zone. As of **Monday, March 15, 2021**, churches in this designation (in the archdiocese, currently Toronto and Peel Regions) will be permitted **15 percent capacity** for religious services.

We began to celebrate public Masses on Monday March 15, 2021 and we will continue to do so until instructed otherwise.

A few very important additional points:

- The Grey (Lockdown) Zones are still very much the areas where positive cases of Covid-19 are highest in the province. For the safety of all, it is imperative that everyone does their part to follow **WorshipSafe guidelines** to protect parishioners, clergy, and staff.
- Please do not congregate in or around the church after services in large numbers. Arrival and dismissal will be co-ordinated in such a fashion to ensure large groups do not congregate. This policy includes weddings, funerals, and baptisms.
- We hope our Livestreaming of services will continue, barring any technological difficulties. The dispensation from the Sunday Eucharist will continue for those of our brethren that find it difficult to attend church physically. The elderly, those with compromised immune systems or other health conditions are asked to exercise extreme caution about any outings, including attendance at church.

HOW TO RESERVE YOUR SEAT

ON SUNDAYS

The parish will be using Eventbrite to facilitate the return to in-person mass. This ticketing system will help us ensure that we do not exceed the 15% capacity on Sundays. It also makes contact tracing possible.

If you still need help, please call Jean (416) 694-2811 and she will secure a seat for you. Don't forget! Click on the orange button (below) to get your ticket for one of next Sunday's Masses.



FUNERALS IN GREY ZONE

Please note that for funerals, at present, the Bereavement Authority of Ontario (BAO) has indicated that funeral home staff will **not be permitted** to assist inside a church if there are more than 50 people present in the Grey Zone. If attendance exceeds that number, funeral home staff have been directed by the BAO to place the casket at the church entrance and return to their vehicles. Upon completion of the service, church personnel / family are to return the casket to the hearse for delivery to the cemetary.



All arrivals without a reservation will be **put on standby** and will be seated in the church **only if the church has not exceeded capacity according to the Worshipsafe guidelines outlined by the Archdiocese of Toronto.** Staff will be present at the entrance of the church at all Sunday masses to guide you.

MARCH WELLNESS TIP

Why does the date of Holy Week change?

The Catholic Church determines the date based on the fact that Christ's death occurred near the Jewish Passover. The First Council of Nicea, held in 325, decided that Easter would be celebrated on the first Sunday after the full moon following the spring equinox, making the earliest possible date for Easter March 22 and the latest possible April 25. Most of the time Easter falls during the first week or two of April. *Source: Catholic News Agency*

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning!

Pope Francis: Prayer and the Holy Spirit

Today we will complete the catechesis on prayer as a relationship with the Holy Trinity, in particular with the Holy Spirit.

The first gift of every Christian existence is the Holy Spirit. It is not one of many gifts, but rather the fundamental Gift. The Spirit is the gift that Jesus had promised to send us. Without the Spirit there is no relationship with Christ and with the Father, because the Spirit opens our heart to God's presence and draws it into that "vortex" of love that is the very heart of God. We are not merely guests and pilgrims on a journey on this earth; we are also guests and pilgrims of the Trinity. We are like Abraham, who one day, welcoming three wayfarers in his own tent, encountered God. If we can truly invoke God, calling him "Abba - Daddy", it is because the Holy Spirit dwells in us; He is the One who transforms us deep within and makes us experience the moving joy of being loved by God as his true children. All the spiritual work within us towards God is performed by the Holy Spirit, this gift. He works within us to carry forward out Christian life towards the Father, with Jesus.

That is why the Church invites us to call upon the Holy Spirit every day, especially at the beginning and the end of every important action. This is the work of the Spirit in us. He "reminds" us of Jesus and makes him present to us, so that he is not reduced to a character from the past: that is, the Spirit brings Jesus to the present in our consciousness. If Christ were only far away in time, we would be alone and lost in the world. But in the Spirit everything is brought to life: the possibility of encountering Christ is open to Christians of every time and place. He is not distant, the Spirit is with us.

This is the experience of so many people who pray: men and women whom the Holy Spirit has formed according to the "measure" of Christ, in mercy, in service, in prayer, in catechesis ... it is a grace to meet people like this: you realize that a different life pulses within them, the way they look "beyond". We can think not only of monks and hermits; they are found among ordinary people, people who have woven a long history of dialogue with God, sometimes of inner struggle, that purifies their faith. These humble witnesses have sought God in the Gospel, in the Eucharist received and adored, in the face of a brother or sister in difficulty, and they safeguard his presence like a secret flame.

The first task of Christians is precisely to keep alive this flame that Jesus brought to the earth (see Lk 12:49), and what is this flame? It is love, the Love of God, the Holy Spirit. Without the of the Spirit, His prophecies fire are extinguished, sorrow supplants joy, routine substitutes love, and service turns into slavery. The image of the lighted lamp next to the Tabernacle, where the Eucharist is reserved, comes to mind. Even when the church empties and evening falls, even when the church is closed, that lamp remains lit, and continues to burn; no one sees it, yet it burns before the Lord. This is how the Spirit is in our heart, always present like that lamp.

There are as many paths of prayer as there are persons who pray, but it is the same Spirit acting in all and with all. Very often it happens that we do not pray, we don't feel like praying, or many times we pray like parrots, with the mouth, but our heart is not in it. This is the moment to say to the Spirit: "Come, come Holy Spirit, warm my heart. Come and teach me to pray, teach me to look to the Father, to look to the Son. Teach me the path of faith. Teach me how to love and, above all, teach me to have an attitude of hope". It means calling on the Spirit continually, so he may be present in our lives.


Featured: Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord

MARCH 25TH

The feast of the Annunciation, now recognized as a solemnity, first was celebrated in the fourth or fifth century. Its central focus is the Incarnation: God has become one of us. From all eternity God had decided that the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity should become human. Now, as Luke 1:26-38 tells us, the decision is being realized. The God-Man embraces all humanity, indeed all creation, to bring it to God in one great act of love. Because human beings have rejected God, Jesus will accept a life of suffering and an agonizing death: "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends" (John 15:13).

Mary has an important role to play in God's plan. From all eternity, God destined her to be the mother of Jesus and closely related to him in the creation and redemption of the world.

We could say that God's decrees of creation and redemption are joined in the decree of Incarnation. Because Mary is God's instrument in the Incarnation, she has a role to play with Jesus in creation and redemption. It is a God-given role. It is God's grace from beginning to end. Mary becomes the eminent figure she is only by God's grace. She is the empty space where God could act. Everything she is she owes to the Trinity.

Mary is the virgin-mother who fulfills Isaiah 7:14 in a way that Isaiah could not have imagined. She is united with her son in carrying out the will of God (Psalm 40:8-9; Hebrews 10:7-9: Luke 1:38).

Together with Jesus, the privileged and graced Mary is the link between heaven and earth. She is the human being who best, after Jesus, exemplifies the possibilities of human existence. She received into her lowliness the infinite love of God. She shows how an ordinary human being can reflect God in the ordinary circumstances of life.

She exemplifies what the Church and every member of the Church is meant to become. She is the ultimate product of the creative and redemptive power of God. She manifests what the Incarnation is meant to accomplish for all of us.
